Housing:	<p>Estimated Cost = \$14 per day (3 Meals per day included)</p> <p>Grand Hotel provides dormitory style housing for its entire staff. Most rooms are configured as one large room with 2 beds, 2 dressers, 2 desks and an area for hanging clothes. 4 Persons typically share bathroom. TV and phone can be hooked up and Human Resources has the phone numbers for these services, payment will be at the students' expense. Located near housing is the Commissary, where there are laundry facilities, vending machines, TV< microwave, coffeemaker, ping-pong, pool table. This is also where the students can exchange dirty linens and towels. Also, internet usage is not available at the hotel or in housing. There is a public library and internet café within two miles of Grand Hotel. Wireless internet connectivity is available in various locations throughout the island. There are no automobiles on the island, so all transportation is by foot or by bicycle.</p>
Any other relevant details:	<p>Mackinac Island is 80% State Park and this provides for miles of biking and hiking trails. The downtown area has a multitude of shops and restaurants. Businesses provide many opportunities for summer workers like activity nights and get togethers that include food prepared from their native country. Entertainment on the Island - Accomplished musicians performing styles from classical, big band, folk, rock, country, and blues, to club DJ's and karaoke abound.</p> <p>America's second national park, Mackinac Island State Park is a nature preserve and learning center for Great Lakes nature enthusiasts. They also offer tours of the historic Fort and other buildings. Walking, biking and riding trails meander through the boreal forest. Natural landmarks such as the slowly-eroding limestone formations of Arch Rock, Devil's Kitchen and Sugar Loaf encourage the traveler to adopt a system of measuring time in hundreds of years, rather than in the hours, minutes, and seconds of everyday life in the twenty-first century.</p> <p>There is also biking, horseback riding, and carriage tours of the island. There are 4 churches that offer a variety of services and activities. Weekly free employee dinners are available at the Catholic Church. This is a chance for international students to meet.</p>

Ecosystem - The landscape of Mackinac Island comprises fields, meadows, marshes, swamps, bogs, coastline, boreal forest, limestone formations and caves. Mackinac Island lies in the Alleghenian Zone. The Hemlock-White Pine hardwood forest has rich undergrowth of birch, elm, and maple. The aquatic insect population is significantly developed and the ecosystem of the Island is dependent on many life forms to keep the balance. On the Island, Mackinac State Historic Parks preserves the environment for all plant and animal life while at the same time provides an atmosphere for humans to reflect, explore and rejuvenate their spirits.
